







Understanding the Differences between the Private Consumption Expenditure and Household Consumption Expenditure

Both Private Consumption Expenditure (PCE) and household consumption expenditure reported in the Household Expenditure Survey (HES) measure consumer spending, and provide insights into economic well-being and living standards. They are, however, **not directly comparable due to differences in coverage and methodology**.

#As reported by the surveyed household and usually refers to the oldest member, the main income earner, the owner-occupier of the house, the person who manages the affairs of the household or the person who supplied the information pertaining to other members.


^Examples include charities and religious organisations providing free or subsidised services to households.

**Examples include Financial Intermediation Services Indirectly Measured (FISIM) which refers to the value of financial services associated with loans & deposits that are not charged directly as fees but are earned through the difference between the interest financial institutions charge on loans and the interest they pay on deposits.*

Examples

A household paid a monthly average of \$Y in premiums to insurers for fire insurance. Find out more on how the expenses are reflected in the HES and PCE and why they are different.



HES reflects \$Y as the expenditure for fire insurance. How about PCE?

PCE records a portion of the full premium, which represents the value of the service provided by insurers.






I see! HES reflects the average monthly premiums paid by the household for fire insurance. PCE only records the estimated value of the insurance services provided by the insurance companies, not the entire sum of insurance premiums.

Emily, a foreign professional who has been working in Singapore for over a year, lives alone and spends \$X on clothing each month.

Although I am a foreigner, my expenditure on clothing is reflected in the PCE as I have lived and worked in Singapore for more than one year.

In contrast, my expenditure is not recorded in the HES because I belong to a non-resident household.
